

THE CBC ACTORS CONSERVATORY PROGRAM OVERVIEW

WHAT IS IT?

The CBC Actors Conservatory is a full-time immersive onscreen acting program. It invites up to eight actors from across Canada to engage in a six-month creative and professional experience to expand their skills, increase their onscreen confidence, and empower them to navigate career and marketplace opportunities.

PROGRAM GOALS

This program is focused on elevating an actor's practice, process, community, and career by:

- Strengthening their instrument, and honing their range, power, and depth
- Expanding their professional reel, and showcasing their onscreen talent
- Engaging in a collaborative script-to-screen process
- Increasing understanding of the screen industry
- Extending their creative community

HOW IT WORKS

The Actors Conservatory experience is a combination of tailored mentorship, workshops, and industry sessions that target the artistic, collaborative, practical, and business aspects of acting for the screen. This full-time, six-month program is designed to increase an actor's confidence working in film and television, while expanding their onscreen portfolio, and establishing strong creative and industry partnerships.

Each actor will have different trajectories and goals coming into and upon leaving the program, so we take a targeted approach to skill development where possible, consulting with participants along the way.

To ensure we have the flexibility to build the most suitable program activities for each cohort, we do not have a set curriculum. Elements of the program, including mentors, guests, and workshops, will change annually according to the needs of the specific cohort and changes in our industry, while continuing to reflect the core components outlined below. We do not operate with a full-time/permanent faculty.

The program is full-time, with the expectation that it is a priority for participants. We schedule a lot of activities, as well as pockets of time for you to digest the learning, and apply feedback to your preparation and practice.

In general, the program runs Monday to Friday during business hours, with exceptions made for guest availability, and for production activities as necessary. We cluster in-person program days wherever possible, with other days being set up for virtual/remote participation, as appropriate.

The CFC does not take any ownership of underlying IP to material brought into or created during the program, but does own the completed produced exercises and showcases, as all insurance, agreements, and ongoing liabilities are with the CFC.

Actors are supported by industry professionals who share knowledge and counsel on best practices and the realities of working in the screen industry. The CBC Actors Conservatory offers actors continued opportunities to put their learning into practice, with guidance and feedback at key stages. Actors refine their creative process and expand their skills through the following:

1. STRENGTHENING YOUR INSTRUMENT

Actors participate in workshops and intensives that explore a variety of approaches and techniques. Actors are challenged artistically within a productive forum, while expanding their acting toolkit.

2. EXPANDING ONSCREEN WORK

The Conservatory offers a variety of on-camera audition workshops, and script-to-screen scene studies and productions. These opportunities are designed to strengthen an actor's onscreen confidence, while adding new work to their reel. Actors will gain a better understanding of how the camera impacts performance, how to work with a director and editor to maximize the cinematic potential of a scene, and how best to interact and engage with industry expectations and onset protocols.

3. BREAKING DOWN THE SCRIPT-TO-SCREEN PROCESS

As part of the larger creative ecosystem at the CFC, actors engage in case studies and workshops that deconstruct how other artists approach screen storytelling. Through this collaborative process, actors will build a deeper understanding of what different

disciplines bring to the onscreen storytelling process, how to effectively engage in the script-to-screen process, and how to expand their creative and professional network.

4. NAVIGATING THE BUSINESS & BUILDING CAREER STRATEGIES

Guests and mentors coach and share knowledge and insights into different aspects of the business, providing tools and strategies for actors to maximize opportunities. Actors come to understand their rights as a performer, their role within the film and TV business, and best practices both on and off screen. They leave the Conservatory with a renewed perspective on building their career, more empowered to manage life as a professional artist.
